Canyon School Profile

Canyon School is located in the town of Pincher Creek within the heart of ranching country in the southwest corner of Alberta.

Our school is composed of students from the town of Pincher Creek, the Municipal District of Pincher Creek # 9 and the Piikani Nation. We house students from Kindergarten through Grade Six. We also house Canyon Kids Preschool, Canyon School Daycare, the Canyon School After-School Program and Brighter Futures program.

Canyon School opened its doors in 1961. Over 270 students attend our Kindergarten to Grade Six programs. Canyon is a tight knit community, educating many students whose parents and grandparents also attended the school.

- Grade 1 (2 classes)
- Grade 2 (2 classes)
- Grade 3 (2 classes)
- Grade 4 (2 classes)

SECTION 2: Data/Evidence

Accountability Pillar Results

Strengths and Areas for Growth were compared to the previous year's results using an analysis of 5% above or below to determine strengths and areas for growth. Through our efforts to encourage parent feedback, we had twice as many parents respond to the survey as compared to the past five year trend. Overall, parents conveyed a strong belief that their children are in a safe and caring school.

Strengths

- Parents and teachers are satisfied that students find school work challenging.
- Parents are satisfied that when the child needs it, teachers are available to help him or her.
- Teachers are satisfied students can access supports for special needs within a timely manner.
- Teachers are satisfied that the school and school jurisdiction has improved or stayed the same in the last three years.
- Teachers are satisfied with professional development.

Areas for Growth

• Teachers are satisfied with parental involvement in decisions about their child's education, however, parents are not satisfied with parental involvement in decisions about their child's education; particularly that their input is considered.



- Teachers are satisfied with the opportunity for students to receive a broad program of studies, however, parents are not satisfied with the opportunity for students to receive a broad program of studies; particularly Art and Physical Education.
- Parents are not satisfied that students model the characteristics of active citizenship; particularly that students follow the rules.

Our overall PAT results improved, but we still need to work on our acceptable level. Our parental involvement category improved slightly, but is still significantly below the provincial average.

 Overall, students improved 6.5% in the acceptable standard. Overall, students improved 6.8% in the standard of excellence. 98% of Canyon's grade 6 students participated in each of the PATs. This is significantly above the provincial average. Canyon School students outperformed the province on the Standard of Excellence for English Language Arts Canyon School students outperformed the province on the acceptable standard for Mathematics, Social Studies and Science. Other than with the Language Arts Acceptable Standard, Canyon students were roughly equal to the provincial average in all P.A.T. test results. The Math acceptable standard results were equal to the province which is a great improvement from the previous year. Areas to Celebrate

Our 2015 *Tell Them From Me Survey* results indicate that our students are either above or on par with the Canadian norm in the following categories:

- Social-Emotional Outcomes:

 - Positive homework behavior
 - Positive behavior at school

- Multiple Choice Questions:
 - 93% of Canyon students feel the students treated each other with respect.

Areas to Examine

Our *Tell Them From Me Survey* results indicate that our students are below the Canadian norm in the following categories:

- Social-Emotional Outcomes:
 - Canyon students displayed a higher level of anxiety than the Canadian average (24% for Canyon, 16% for Canadian norm; 30% for Canyon girls, 20% for Canadian norm for girls.)
 - Involvement in school clubs (5% less the Canadian norm)
 - Have a positive learning environment
