But her first day at the St Joseph Mission near Williams Lake, BC was nothing like she expected. Her orange shirt was taken away from her, never to be returned"... Since 2013, September 30 is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to all come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for future generations. LRSD has participated for the past few years and has purchased copies of the Orange Shirt Story book and lesson plans to help spread awareness in a student friendly way.

Several students had the opportunity at once again attend the FNMI Summit, hosted at Piikani School. Here they heard from various guest speakers who challenged them to learn and grow.






Our year once again concluded with our FNMI

HORSE SPIRIT



Matthew Halton High School has been offering Therapeutic Horsemanship to our students for the past 3 years. Program is facilitated by Matthew Halton Success Coach Ty Provost and FNMI elder Pat Provost through their business Horse Spirit. Horse Spirit has been working with schools in the division since 2015, F.P. Walshe High School and Canyon Elementary School being the first to offer the program. The program is available to all students on a referral base. Program accepts a maximum of 10 students, this number ensures that each student participating receives the full benefit of the program. Therapeutic Horsemanship is not a traditional horse program, it is so much more. The Blackfoot cultural foundation mixed with years of horse knowledge offered by Ty and Pat Provost brings a unique holistic approach to wellness. The program is a hands on life skills training through horses with onthe-ground exercise and horseback activities. This allows students to work on anxiety, selfesteem, problem solving, focus, respect, and confidence building. Students learn everything about horses from the ground up and because horses have such strong spirits and are able to mirror our human emotions, students really have to be honest with their own emotions and acknowledge them. So in return students are actually learning about themselves and self control through the horses. Students selected are always a mix of FNMI and Non-FNMI students which helps create a more cultural awareness for all students in the school. Success Coach Ty Provost and FNMI Elder Pat Provost always look forward to having a great program and hope every student finds their own successes.

Granum students joined in reconciliation through the "Honoring Memories, Planting Dreams" activity created by the First Nations Caring Society.





FNMI Feather Blessing
















We were very lucky to have local author




Julian Black Antelope: Keynote Speaker at Walshe


